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FIRST PART SYLLABUS REVIEW - THIRD EDITION

This document outlines the recent changes made to the College of Intensive Care Medicine's First Part Syllabus which will be examinable for the First Part Examination in August/October 2018 and onwards. The First Part Examination Committee has attempted to keep the Syllabus relevant to modern ICU practices and to that aim, have reduced several areas and made a few minor additions. The new syllabus can be found on the CICM website here.

Below is a short summary to highlight the changes to the Syllabus.

TOPICS THAT HAVE BEEN REMOVED / REDUCED

- Statistics and Data Interpretation
- Toxicology and Overdose
- Toxicity of Agents:
 - o Toxicity of agents has been reduced; however, will be mentioned in the Pharmacopeia and highlighted as an area of required knowledge.
- Microbiology:
 - Selected aspects of microbiology have been reduced. Particularly information related to viruses and fungi. Only a general classification of viruses and fungi, and knowledge of common agents used to treat, are now expected.
- The pharmacology related to Chemotherapy
- Principles of Electrical Safety

TOPICS THAT HAVE BEEN ADDED

- Physiology and Pharmacology related to enteral and parenteral nutrition
- Anatomy relevant to brain stem reflexes
- Oxygen delivery devices (physical principles of)

The Pharmacopeia has also been rationalised to better reflect current ICU practices.

Trainees are <u>strongly encouraged</u> to examine the complete Syllabus prior to enrolling in the exam.
